Spotlight on Your Neighbor

When the garage door is open, you might hear the table saw's whine and see Ed Clark cutting, sanding or drilling on his next project. Ed started his woodworking hobby ten years ago, and he makes the cutest bird houses, beautiful furniture, and other artful wood items just for fun. His wife Linda said after he made his first bird house, she encouraged him to keep at it. And keep at it he has by making the most detailed, artistically designed and crafted bird houses any person or bird will probably ever see.

Ed and Linda found Heron River after looking around the Treasure Valley for a good community in a rural setting. They love Heron River's location with many birds to see and some who visit their bird feeders backyard. They moved here in September 2015.

When Ed was born, he literally put the town of Wendell, Idaho on the map. Ed's birth put the town's population at 1,001 and that was enough to put it on the map. Linda grew up in Pennsylvania. Ed and Linda married and ended up living in Porterville, California.

Ed spent six summers fighting forest fires with the U.S. Forest Service. One summer, he and 12 other crew members became trapped by a raging forest fire and nearly died. As the fire totally encircled them, a tanker plane swooped down and dropped fire retardant, allowing them to escape the oncoming wall of flames. The plane was extremely low, and as it banked to climb, it crashed, killing the pilot who knew full well that he had saved their lives. Ed worked for a private civil engineering firm that specialized in surface water and hydrology. Ed then worked for the

City of Porterville as a Public Works Inspector until his retirement. Ed is a Charter Member of the Antique Barbed Wire Society winning numerous awards with his collections.

Linda worked as a legal secretary in a Porterville law office for a number of years. Then she worked for the City of Porterville eventually becoming the city's Public Transportation Manager. Linda also taught business classes during evenings for ten years at the local junior college there. They moved to Heron River after she retired from her job with the city.

Ed and Linda have three adult children and one granddaughter. Linda's sister recently moved to Middleton, and one of Ed's older brothers, Dell and his wife, Peggy, recently bought a new house in Heron River.

The most frequent cause of disaster in our area is extreme weather with high winds, violent thunderstorms and heavy rains. Ms. Jeffries relayed that Idaho is ranked #6 for earthquakes based on frequency, but most are not even felt. Other disasters include wildfires, floods, mudslides, utility failures and hazardous materials. The newly updated NOAA Advanced Hydrologic Prediction Service website is an interactive resource. Simply enter your address and it will display how much flooding can occur based on the amount of water released from upstream.

To find this interactive website, Google search for "Boise River Inundation Map."

Holiday Safety Tips – ACTION Deputy Terry Lakey, Star Police Deputy Zach Hessing and Community Relations Officer Lauren Hooker of the Ada County Sheriff's Department spoke on December 6th at our Community Center. They explained that many crimes of opportunity happen in December.

Tips to stay safe and secure are:

- 1) Keep all valuables out of sight in your car. If you are shopping place your packages in the trunk and don't carry too many packages at once. Don't put your purse in your trunk as you leave your car. Someone may be watching.
- 2) Be aware of your surroundings and any suspicious person(s).
- 3) Park in a well-lit area and carry your keys in your hand so you don't search for them when you arrive at your car. Use the panic button on your key fob if you feel threatened.
- 4) Never leave your purse or wallet unattended. This includes turning your back on your purse when grocery shopping. Many wallets are stolen from unsuspecting shoppers.
- 5) Prevent package thefts by tracking your packages to know when they will be delivered. When possible, have the delivery company text you when they are delivered. Have a trusted neighbor get your packages if you are not home.

Deputy Hessing stated that he has only had one call in the past 6 month involving Heron River. Star is a community with fewer crime incidents and our Heron River Neighborhood Watch program further reduces opportunities for criminal activity. When you see something – say something by calling the Non-Emergency Dispatch at (208) 377-6790. Do not ramble. Be specific in your concern and answer all questions directly. Who, what, when, where and vehicle and suspect information are helpful. If you can take a photo, without putting yourself in jeopardy, do so.

History: Oregon Trail & Heron River

Did the Oregon Trail come through the Heron River subdivision and the City of Star? Surprise!

Yes, one later branch of the Oregon Trail came right through Heron River as it followed the north bank of the Boise River. Portions of this trail became Valley Road which is now West State Street. The old trail was later used by the stage coaches to get from Boise City to Gray's Station in the area of Moon Valley Road.

Check out Star Cemetery on W. Floating Feather Road. It has headstones of those who died along the Oregon Trail. The oldest are dated 1871. One hand-hewn stone gravestone dated November 9, 1972 is for Hester A. Riley. She and her husband, William came from Pennsylvania and she died near here while apparently traveling on the Oregon Trail.
